



# Matching Ordering Discovery

**Name Bingo**

Because names are already printed on these cards, no prep is needed when playing Name Bingo. Using game markers, students cover each letter on the card one letter at a time. If the name cards are numbered, an enrichment activity would be to play several games of 10 or 15 minutes, you need to have keep students busy in case an unexpected change in the day's lesson plan. **Fishing**

With simple paper clips, any set of small flash cards can be made into a fishing game. Choose the flash cards with a hole punch or request help from the school's janitor to punch the most cards. Once on the cards are ready, they must be able to say all the cards or give them up to the teacher or the other player.

**High Fives!**

There's no rule that says flash cards have to be rectangular! High five flash cards involve students by gesture! Print these cards along a wall or on a space where students regularly play. They can also be used for only games or activity in place of regular cards.

**Discovery**

This is a quick discovery game using students' names! Using a piece of paper with a hole hole cut out of the center, punch the piece of paper all around to make card to students can only guess the words. Use a hole punch to punch the words onto a sheet of paper, always including the name, and to have. Help students by reading out the words and use student responses for names.

**Karuta (Slap Game)**

Spread cards out on a table face up. The teacher, or designated student, says a word and players try to be the first to slap the card. Try this game using 10 minutes. To use there is no random shuffling of cards, when the card that a player makes a mistake, they lose a bet. This is a great game for any lesson!

**Touch!**

This is another great ESL activity for getting students out of their seats! Simply choose words around the room and have students go to the words. Words: "Touch, touch, touch!" An activity for older students is to use picture flash cards, e.g. police station, bank, etc. After going correctly to the word, students must say, "Where are you?" or "Where is there?" Students respond with, "I'm at the bank" or "There is the bank." This also works well when students begin studying and learn with "Click with us, where did you go?" and "I want to be a doctor!"
