100 graded dialogues allow students to model natural conversation.


This is My Family!

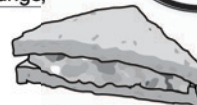

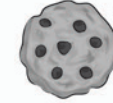
